

A reading from the Book of Wisdom

The just man, though he die early, shall be at rest.

For the age that is honorable comes not with the passing of time, nor can it be measured in terms of years.

Rather, understanding is the hoary crown for men, and an unsullied life, the attainment of old age.

He who pleased God was loved;
he who lived among sinners was transported –
Snatched away, lest wickedness pervert his mind
or deceit beguile his soul;

For the witchery of paltry things obscures what is right and the whirl of desire transforms the innocent mind.

Having become perfect in a short while,
he reached the fullness of a long career;
for his soul was pleasing to the Lord,
therefore he sped him out of the midst of wickedness.

But the people saw and did not understand, nor did they take this into account. Because grace and mercy are with his holy ones, and his care is with his elect.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

Isaiah 25:6a, 7-9

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah

On this mountain the Lord of hosts will provide for all peoples.

On this mountain he will destroy the veil that veils all peoples,

The web that is woven over all nations; he will destroy death forever.

The Lord God will wipe away the tears from all faces;

The reproach of his people he will remove from the whole earth; for the Lord has spoken.

On that day it will be said:

"Behold our God, to whom we looked to save us!

This is the Lord for whom we looked;

let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!"

[pause momentarily, then say:]

Lamentations 3:17-26

A reading from the Book of Lamentations

The soul is deprived of peace,
I have forgotten what happiness is;
I tell myself my future is lost,
all that I hoped for from the Lord.

The thought of my homeless poverty is wormwood and gall;
Remembering it over and over leaves my soul downcast within me.
But I will call this to mind,
as my reason to have hope:

The favors of the Lord are not exhausted, his mercies are not spent;
They are renewed each morning, so great is his faithfulness.
My portion is the Lord, says my soul; therefore will I hope in him.

Good is the Lord to one who waits for him, to the soul that seeks him;
It is good to hope in silence for the saving help of the Lord.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

A reading from the Book of the Prophet Daniel

[I, Daniel, mourned and I heard this word of the Lord:]

"At the time there shall arise

Michael, the great prince,

guardian of your people;

It shall be a time unsurpassed in distress

since nations began until that time.

At that time your people shall escape,

everyone who is found written in the book.

Many of those who sleep

in the dust of the earth shall awake:

Some shall live forever,

others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace.

But the wise shall shine brightly

like the splendor of the firmament,

And those who lead the many to justice

shall be like the stars forever."

[pause momentarily, then say:]

A reading from the second Book of Maccabees

Judas, the ruler of Israel,

then took up a collection among all his soldiers, amounting to two thousand silver drachmas, which he sent to Jerusalem to provide for a sin offering.

In doing this, he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in mind;

For if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for the dead.

But if he did this with a view to the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought.

Thus he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from their sin.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

long version Proverbs 31:10-31

A reading from the Book of Proverbs

The valiant woman – who can find her?

She is far beyond the price of pearls.

Her husband's heart has confidence in her,

from her he will derive no little profit.

Advantage and not hurt she brings him all the days of her life.

She is always busy with wool and with flax,

she does her work with eager hands.

She is like a merchant vessel

bringing her food from far away.

She gets up while it is still dark giving her household their food,

giving orders to her servants.

She sets her mind on a field, then she buys it;

with what her hands have earned, she plants a vineyard.

She puts her back into her work and shows how strong her arms can be.

She finds her labor well worth while; her lamp does not go out a night.

She holds her hand out to the poor,

she opens her arms to the needy.

She is clothed in strength and dignity,

she can laugh at the days to come.

When she opens her mouth, she does so wisely;

on her tongue is kindly instruction.

A reading from the Book of Jeremiah

Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, whose hope is the LORD.

He is like a tree planted beside the waters that stretches out its roots to the stream:

It fears not the heat when it comes, its leaves stay green;

In the year of drought it shows no distress, but still bears fruit.

More tortuous than all else is the human heart, beyond remedy; who can understand it?

I, the LORD, alone probe the mind and test the heart,

To reward everyone according to his ways, according to the merit of his deeds.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

**Ecclesiastes 3: 1-8** 

A reading from the Book of Ecclesiastes

There is an appointed time for everything, and a time for every affair under the heavens.

A time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to uproot the plant.

A time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to tear down, and a time to build.

A reading from the Book of Isaiah

He gives strength to the fainting; for the weak he makes vigor abound.

long version Acts 10:34-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter proceeded to address the people in these words:

"I begin to see how true it is that God shows no partiality.

Rather, the man of any nation who fears God and acts uprightly is acceptable to him.

This is the message he has sent to the Sons of Israel, 'the good news of peace' proclaimed through Jesus Christ who is Lord of all.

I take it you know what has been reported all over Judea about Jesus of Nazareth, beginning in Galilee with the baptism John preached; of the way God anointed him with the Holy Spirit and power.

He went about doing good works and healing all who were in the grip of the devil, and God was with him.

We are witnesses to all that he did in the land of the Jews and in Jerusalem.

They killed him finally, 'hanging him on a tree,'

only to have God raise him up on the third day and grant that he be seen, not by all,

but only by such witnesses as had been chosen beforehand by God – by us who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

He commissioned us to preach to the people and to bear witness that he is the one set apart by God as judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets testify,

saying that everyone who believes in him has forgiveness of sins through his name."

[pause momentarily, then say:]

short version Acts 10:34-36, 42-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter proceeded to address the people in these words:

"I begin to see how true it is that God shows no partiality.
Rather, the man of any nation who fears God
and acts uprightly is acceptable to him.

This is the message he has sent to the Sons of Israel, 'the good news of peace' proclaimed through Jesus Christ who is Lord of all.

He commissioned us to preach to the people and to bear witness that he is the one set apart by God as judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets testify, saying that everyone who believes in him has forgiveness of sins through his name."

[pause momentarily, then say:]

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Hope will not leave us disappointed,

because the love of God has been poured out in our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.

At the appointed time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for us godless men.

It is rare that anyone should lay down his life for a just man, though it is barely possible that for a good man someone may have the courage to die.

It is precisely in this that God proves his love for us:

That while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

Now that we have been justified by his blood,

it is all the more certain that we shall be saved by him from God's wrath.

For if, when we were God's enemies,

we were reconciled to him by the death of his Son, it is all the more certain that we who have been reconciled will be saved by his life.

Not only that; we go so far as to make God our boast through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

Romans 5:17-21

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

If death began its reign through one man because of his offense, much more shall those who receive the overflowing grace and gift of justice live and reign through the one man, Jesus Christ.

To sum up then: just as a single offense brought condemnation to all men, a single righteous act brought all men acquittal and life.

Just as through one man's disobedience all became sinners, so through one man's obedience all shall become just.

The law came in order to increase offenses;
but despite the increase of sin,
grace has far surpassed it,
so that, as sin reigned through death,
grace may reign by way of justice leading to eternal life,
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

(long version) Romans 6:3-9

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Are you not aware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?

Through baptism into his death we were buried with him, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live a new life.

If we have been united with him through likeness to his death, so shall we be through a like resurrection.

This we know: our old self was crucified with him

so that the sinful body might be destroyed and we might be slaves to sin no longer.

A man who is dead has been freed from sin.

If we have died with Christ, we believe that we are also to live with him.

We know that Christ, once raised from the dead, will never die again; death has no more power over him.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

(short version) Romans 6:3-4, 8-9

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Are you not aware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?

Through baptism into his death we were buried with him, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live a new life.

If we have died with Christ, we believe that we are also to live with him.

We know that Christ, once raised from the dead, will never die again; death has no more power over him.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

Romans 8:14-23

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

All who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God.

You did not receive a spirit of slavery leading you back into fear, but a spirit of adoption through which we cry out, "Abba!", "Father".

The Spirit himself gives witness with our spirit that we are children of God. But if we are children, we are heirs as well:

heirs of God, heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so as to be glorified with him.

I consider the sufferings of the present to be as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed in us.

Indeed, the whole created world eagerly awaits the revelation of the sons of God.

Creation was made subject to futility,
not of its own accord but by him who once subjected it;
yet not without hope,
because the world itself will be freed from its slavery to corruption
and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God.

Yes, we know that all creation groans and is in agony even until now.

Not only that, but we ourselves, although we have the Spirit as first fruits, groan inwardly while we await the redemption of our bodies.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

Romans 8:31-35, 37-39

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

If God is for us, who can be against us?

Is it possible that he who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for the sake of us all will not grant us all things besides?

Who shall bring a charge against God's chosen ones? God, who justifies?

Who shall condemn them? Christ Jesus, who died or rather was raised up, who is at the right hand of God and who intercedes for us?

Who will separate us from the love of Christ?

Trial, or distress, or persecution, or hunger, or nakedness, or danger, or the sword?

Yet in all this we are more than conquerors because of him who has loved us.

For I am certain that neither death nor life, neither angels nor principalities, neither the present nor that future, nor powers, neither height nor depth, nor any other creature, will be able to separate us from the love of God that comes to us in Christ Jesus, our Lord.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

Romans 14:7-9, 10-12

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

None of us lives as his own master and none of us dies as his own master.

While we live we are responsible to the Lord, and when we die we die as his servants.

Both in life and death we are the Lord's.

That is why Christ died and came to life again, that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living.

We shall all have to appear before the judgment seat of God.

It is written,

"As surely as I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me and every tongue shall give praise to God."

Every one of us will have to give an account of himself before God.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

1 Corinthians 15:20-24, 25-28

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Death came through a man; hence the resurrection of the dead comes through a man also.

Just as in Adam all die, so in Christ all will come to life again, but each one in proper order: Christ the first fruits and then, at his coming, all those who belong to him.

After that will come the end, when, after having destroyed every sovereignty, authority, and power, he will hand over the kingdom to God the Father.

Christ must reign until God has put all enemies under his feet, and the last enemy to be destroyed is death.

Scripture reads that God "has placed all things under his feet."

But when it says that everything has been made subject, it is clear that he who has made everything subject to Christ is excluded.

When, finally, all has been subjected to the Son, he will then subject himself to the One, who made all things subject to him, so that God may be all in all.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

1 Corinthians 15: 51-57

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

I am going to tell you a mystery.

Not all of us shall fall asleep, but all of us are to be changed – in an instant, in the twinkling of an eye, at the sound of the last trumpet.

The trumpet will sound and the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed.

This corruptible body must be clothed with incorruptibility, this mortal body with immortality.

When the corruptible frame takes on incorruptibility and the mortal immortality, then will the saying of Scripture be fulfilled:

"Death is swallowed up in victory."

"O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?"

The sting of death is sin, and sin gets its power from the law.

But thanks be to God who has given us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians

We know that when the earthly tent in which we dwell is destroyed we have a dwelling provided for us by God, a dwelling in the heavens, not made by hands but to last forever.

Therefore we continue to be confident.

We know that while we dwell in the body we are away from the Lord.

We walk by faith, not by sight.

I repeat, we are full of confidence and would much rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord.

This being so, we make it our aim to please him whether we are with him or away from him.

The lives of all of us are to be revealed before the tribunal of Christ so that each one may receive his recompense, good or bad, according to his life in the body.

[pause momentarily then say:]

Philippians 3:20-21

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Philippians

We have our citizenship in heaven; it is from there that we eagerly await the coming of our savior, the Lord Jesus Christ.

He will give a new form to this lowly body of ours and remake it according to the pattern of his glorified body, by his power to subject everything to himself.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

1 Thessalonians: 4, 13-18

A reading from the first Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians

We would have you be clear about those who sleep in death, brothers; otherwise you might yield to grief, like those who have no hope.

For if we believe that Jesus died and rose,

God will bring forth with him from the dead
those also who have fallen asleep believing in him.

We say to you, as if the Lord himself had said it, that we who live, who survive until his coming, will in no way have an advantage over those who have fallen asleep.

No, the Lord himself will come down from heaven at the word of command, at the sound of the archangel's voice and God's trumpet; and those who have died in Christ will rise first.

Then we, the living, the survivors, will be caught up with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Thenceforth we shall be with the Lord unceasingly.

Console one another with this message.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

A reading from the second Letter of Saint Paul to Timothy

Remember that Jesus Christ, a descendant of David, was raised from the dead.

This is the Gospel I preach; in preaching it I suffer as a criminal, even to the point of being thrown into chains – but there is no chaining the word of God!

Therefore I bear with all of this for the sake of those whom God has chosen, in order that they may obtain the salvation to be found in Christ Jesus and with it eternal glory.

You can depend on this:

If we have died with him,
we shall also live with him:
If we hold out to the end,
we shall also reign with him.
But if we deny him
he will deny us.
If we are unfaithful
he will still remain faithful;
for he cannot deny himself.

[pause momentarily, then say:]

1 John 3:1-2

A reading from the first Letter of Saint John

See what love the Father has bestowed on us in letting us be called children of God!

Yes that in fact is what we are.
