



Today we celebrate the Third Sunday of Lent. The family concludes the meal prayer and prayer for others with the sign of the cross as they share

dinner with one another.

A child kneels next to their bed to offer their bed time prayers. They reflect on the beauty of the day and thank God for all things great and small. In addition to their own needs, they remember to ask God to bless those who are hurting, those who don't have a bed to sleep in, a pet to play with, or a roof over their head. The child rises from the floor, crawls into bed, and drifts peacefully off to sleep.
