I am blessed to receive notes of support; words of encouragement and wisdom-filled reflections from many people from many walks of life. Those that speak to my heart, and deepen my love for God are often found making their way into my bulletin article. Today is another example of such a message that I am happy to share with you.

The following reflection is titled, "Heart Made by God", written by Fr. Austin Fleming

"If what they say about snowflakes is true, Lord: that no two are exactly alike, how much more true must that be of human hearts...

Earlier this year a member of their family, 51 years old, died from COVID-19. The family is grieving the loss, the death of their family member.

Last Sunday, I had to get a COVID test, and if the test came back "Negative" I would be welcomed at the surgery center – if it came back "Positive" the surgery would have needed to be rescheduled.

As we go into big box stores signs indicate that masks are to be worn. As we go into local funeral homes, to offer prayers and support to the grieving, we are told that masks are to be worn. When we enter doctor's office buildings, we are reminded that masks are to be worn properly. As you enter the doors of the Church of St. Mary you may have seen the note that reads, "For the love of your neighbor you are asked to wear a mask when at Mass." If asked, are masks required at Church, the answer is no, they are not. The State and the Archdiocese continues to look at the big picture, what is of benefit for the whole of society, for the greater good with the latest roll-out of protocols and guidelines regarding wearing masks, social distancing, etc. There will be more updates and revised protocols in the coming weeks as we live with COVID.

As brothers and sisters in the Lord, we are to share our faith and to express our faith in action, and when necessary, we can use words. My prayer the last two years has been for healing and wellbeing for all from this incredibly devastating COVID-19. It is my belief that we will continue to learn how to live safely as we go forward. May you and your loved ones be healthy and free from the effects of COVID. May we all continue to pray for those who have died from the disease and pray that efforts will continue to halt and limit its spread.

I hope you will see me soon, hobbling around the parish with my walker or cane as I make it through physical therapy, healing from my recent knee replacement.
