Journeying in prayer these Lenten days, may the following story that the rector of Holy Name Cathedral shared with his parishioners expand our faith.

A man had four sons. He wanted his sons to learn not to judge things too quickly, so he sent them each, in turn, on a quest to go and look at a pear tree that was a great distance away.

The first son went in the winter, the second in the spring, the third son in the summer, and the fourth son in the fall. When they had all gone and come back, he called them together to describe what they had seen.

The first son said that the tree was ugly, bent and twisted.

The second son said no, it was covered with green buds and full of promise.

The third son disagreed; he said it was laden with blossoms that smelled so sweet and looked so beautiful. It was the most graceful thing he had ever seen.

The fourth son disagreed with all of them; he said it was ripe and drooping with fruit, full of life and fulfillment.

Then the man explained to his sons that they were all correct because each had seen only one season in the tree's life.

He told them that you cannot judge a tree - or a person - by only one season and that the essence of who they are and the pleasure, joy, and love that come from that life can only be measured at the end when all the seasons are up.

If you give up when it is winter, you will miss the promise of your spring, the beauty of your summer, and the fulfillment of your fall.

Conclusions – Don't let the pain of one season destroy the joy of all the rest.

Don't judge life by one difficult season. Persevere through the difficult patches and better times are sure to come some time later.

The lesson of the pear tree contains a Gospel message for all of us. We have all experienced different seasons in our lives. Even Jesus experienced the joys and pains of life all the way to the cross. However, Jesus trusted God his Father and we are invited daily to do the same. By the way, a life filled with love, forgiveness, sharing compassion, faith and joy is always in season.
