# St. Mary

Since 1917, the School of St. Mary has helped children grow in their Catholic faith. Students attend Mass on feast days of Christ, the Blessed Mother, the Apostles and various saints throughout the year. Faith formation activities include prayer services, the Rosary, retreats, confession in Advent and Lent and regular catechesis in the classroom.

In November 2012, the School of St. Mary was honored to receive the





## Excellence in Education Blue Ribbon Award

from the U.S. Department of Education. Out of approximately 135,000 public and private schools, 269 schools received this award recognizing excellence in education. Of the 269 schools selected, only 50 were non-public institutions.

St. Mary is recognized as an exemplary, high performing school. "High performing" means that the achievement of the school's students in the most recent year tested places the school in the top 15 percent of the nation in reading (or English language arts) and mathematics as measured by a nationally normed test.

### INCOME STATEMENT FINANCIAL FOOTNOTES

### The Parish of St. Mary Accounting Policies

The Parish of St. Mary's financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis, which is a comprehensive basis other than generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America (US GAAP). Under the modified cash basis of accounting, adjustments to the cash basis accounts are made to conform to certain Archdiocesan provisions. Revenues and expenses are recognized only as cash received or paid, except as for certain modifications specified by the Archdiocese. Prepaid tuition is recognized as a liability in the statements of financial position - modified cash basis, and the Parish endowment funds are recorded at fair value as provided by the Archdiocese. In addition, the Archdiocesan provisions require real property of the Parish to be held in trust by the Archdiocese of Chicago. Other land and buildings, such as rental properties and the Primary Grade Center land, are carried at cost by the Parish and are not depreciated.

### Note {1}—Investments & Endowment Funds

The Parish of St. Mary holds two endowment fund assets, each with a permanently restricted corpus and both held in charter with the Archdiocesan Bank. The Parish Educational Endowment Fund (PEEF) is restricted for educational use only by the Parish. The Parish can draw from the balance of temporarily restricted realized gains at any point in time to support the further education of children and adults alike through the Religious Education program, Evangelization or the School. Changes in the balances are from pooled investment gains or losses and donations received by the Church and deposited into the fund.

The RJB Scholarship Endowment Fund corpus was donated from an anonymous donor in 2007 for the purpose of supporting families with financial need in attending the School of St. Mary. Per the charter, only 5% of temporarily restricted realized gains can be withdrawn annually.

### Note {4}—School of St. Mary Tuition

- \$46,800 was received as tuition subsidy from St. Patrick's Church for children that were parishioners of St. Patrick's who attended the School of St. Mary in FY2013.
- \$35,676 of uncollected tuition from prior years was collected and recorded in income in the current year. All but \$27,000 of tuition due in FY2013 was collected.

### Note {5}—School of St. Mary Parent's Club Donations

A total of \$250,365 was raised by the Parent's Club in FY2013 and was designated for the following purposes:

- \$170,000 was donated from the School of St. Mary Parent's Club to support school operating expenses
- \$80,365 was raised for academic year 2013-2014 financial aid for need based families and is included in temporarily restricted funds

### INCOME STATEMENT FINANCIAL FOOTNOTES

### Note (6)—Archdiocesan Assessments

The Parish of St. Mary pays three assessments to the Chicago Archdiocese annually:

### **Archdiocese Assessment**

The Archdiocese Assessment is billed at 10% of the Church's ordinary income (less interest) from FY2011 reported closed financials. This assessment positively impacts the Parish of St. Mary with supporting functions such as: financial, operational, legal, insurance, human resources, payroll, employee benefits, religious education as well as pastoral and liturgical functions.

### Office of Catholic Schools Assessment (OCS)

The Office of Catholic Schools Assessment (OCS) is billed at a rate per student. The cost per student in FY2011, FY2012 & FY2013 was \$23.00. The Office of Catholic Schools helps to support the School of St. Mary with services concerning human resources, legal, instructional and educational issues.

### Priest Retirement Mutual Aid Association Assessment (PRMAA)

The PRMAA Assessment supports the retirement fund for our priests within the Chicago Archdiocese. The amount billed by PRMAA is 3.5% of the total church operating revenue (less interest) of FY2012 reported closed financials.

### Note {7}—Capital Improvements

• Parish contributed \$280,000 to complete the North School Building AC & Sprinkler project from parish reserves.

### Note {8}—School Upper Grade Center Loan Payoff

- Parish paid \$404,588 in FY2013 to payoff the debt from the School Upper Grade Learning Center addition and renovation in 2005.
- \$2,648,121 was the original loan balance in 2005.
- Parish sold a residential property in 2006 for \$536,635 which was applied to the debt.
- \$900,000 of a bequest the parish received in 2011 was also applied to the debt.
